TIPS FOR INCREASED RESPONSES:

Students can access their end-of-course evaluations by clicking the **Course Evaluations** option in their Canvas courses or by using the link sent in their reminder email. To increase your overall response rate on end-of-course evaluations, CAFE recommends the following best practices:

- Briefly remind students in class how important these surveys are for improving the quality of instruction.
- Discuss ways in which the course has improved based on previous feedback.
- One of the most effective and simplest methods is to allow students time in class to complete the surveys. Just set aside about 5 minutes at the end of class. Step out of the room to give them a sense of privacy.
- Offer students a simple reward if the class meets or exceeds a percentage response rate. For example, one professor shared that he provides donuts for his students if the class hits an 80% response rate.

Proctoring Online Exams

Proctoring exams, especially online exams, is always a difficult challenge. For online exams, the University of Missouri System recommends using [Honorlock](#), a record-and-review platform that allows you to proctor online exams through Canvas. Honorlock records students' attempts and flags any suspicious behavior. Honorlock has certain [technical requirements for students](#) to meet before they can use it. It is relatively straightforward to configure for most exam situations and offers several useful features, such as locking down the browser, blocking AI tools, and search-and-destroy for leaked exam content. It also works with third-party tools that are integrated into Canvas such as Pearson's Mastering suite or McGraw Hill Connect.

What Do Students Look for in a Professor?

When students recommend professors to their fellow students, do they tend to recommend professors based on easiness of grading or likeability? Or do they consider the overall teaching effectiveness of that instructor? ACUE attempted to answer this question in a recent study funded by the Lumina Foundation (Benavides, Lawner, & Snow, 2024). Their findings revealed that students' comments when recommending professors converge into four broad themes (p. 3):

1. Instructional clarity – students respond favorably when communication of content, assignments, and expectations is clear and comprehensible.
2. Student support – students like to know that instructors care about the success and growth of their students and that there are sufficient resources available to assist them in their success.
3. Instructor Attributes - Perceived instructor attributes can positively affect student learning experiences, such as being prepared for class and demonstrating kindness.
4. Active Learning - Students enjoy learning methods that make them feel more engaged and make the learning relevant and interactive.

Although the demographic characteristics of the *students* impacted their relative perception of each of the factors above relative to one another, the demographics of the *instructor* (race, gender, ethnicity, etc.) had no significant impact on student perceptions of the quality of teaching, according to this study (p. 5). For example, students in online/hybrid courses strongly favored instructional clarity and student support over the perceived attributes of the instructor or active learning strategies (p. 6). Latino students placed greater emphasis on student support over other factors (p. 6).
